World Book Day - Thursday 3rd March 2022


This year World Book Day is celebrating 25 years of bringing a love of reading to children and young adults.

It has been some time since the garden has been pampered so he will need many helpers!


He has lots of seeds to sow and we also have a mission set by "Leek allotment and garden holders association."

What Parents Need to Know about Wink

Wink is a messaging app which allows children to connect and communicate with other users. In a similar style to Tinder, Wink uses the swipe method for browsing profiles and accepting or declining them. Once two users have accepted each other by swiping on each other's profile, they can then communicate and play games online together. The fact that Wink allows children to share photos, personal information and their location with other users has caused significant concern.

In the guide, you'll find tips on a number of potential risks such as grooming, cyberbullying and inappropriate content.



Pancake Day

The children return to school on Tuesday 1st March which is Pancake Day.

They will be partaking in our traditional Pancake Day race.

Where did pancake races come from?

The pancake race is thought to originate in the town of Olney in Buckinghamshire, England, where they still host a traditional ladies-only race each year.

The Olney pancake race has been run since 1445, so there is no doubt that it is the spiritual home of the event.

Whilst the reason for its invention is not certain, the most widely accepted tale is of a woman so busy making pancakes that she was about to miss a church service. On hearing the church bells she ran out of the house and had to flip the pancake in her pan to stop it burning on the way to the church.

The race in Olney has traditionally been run with the finishing line of the church steps, in keeping with this story.




<u>Sparks</u>

Mrs Goldstraw has created a "British History Timeline" to depict all the things Flickers have been learning about this year.


It starts as long ago as 43AD and the Roman conquest. It then moves on to the year 450 and the Egyptians.

As you can see they have learnt about lots of really interesting topics delivered by someone who is really passionate and knowledgeable about History, our very own Mrs Goldstraw.








<u>Flames</u>
